We're still collecting inputs on several historical themes including "Quakerism in Our Two Communities", "Commerce, Trade & Industry" and "Schools & Education", as well as seeking leadership on themes including "The Natural Environment", "War & Peace" and "Village Sports & Leisure". And here as promised are the answers to Quiz No. 1 in last month's magazine.

Our Village Pubs

- How many pubs were there in Seer Green in 1900? Which one was the oldest?
 There were three pubs in Seer Green in 1900 The Yew Trees, The Jolly Cricketers and The Three Horseshoes. The Horseshoes was the oldest.
- 2. Which family ran The Jolly Cricketers for 160 years? A2. The Cyster family ran The Cricketers for 160 years.
- 3. Where and when can you finally get a drink in Jordans?

 A3. You can get a drink in Jordans at The Jolly Quaker on the first Friday of most months.

The Manor of Seer Green

- 4. Seer Green is not explicitly mentioned in the Doomsday Book, probably because it formed part of which Manor?
- A4. Seer Green formed part of the Manor of Farnham Royal.
- 5. In what year was the hamlet of Seer Green first recorded as La Sere in a Close Roll of Henry III?
- A5. The hamlet of Seer Green was recorded as la Sere in a Close Roll of Henry III in the year

How feasible is solar power in Jordans?

Dear All

We are fortunate to be living in a comparatively stable country, albeit things are bit dodgy at the moment!

However, the world is not stable. The enemy is climate change.

It could be argued we are too protected in our little village – 'someone will sort it out some time' type of attitude.

When we get off the M40, left up the hill on Potkiln, breathe the fresh air, relax, we are home and safe.

Are we safe though – certainly not from the effects of climate change!

Are we sure we do not have to do anything now?

Our country has developed several sources of energy including solar. The best thing about solar, or PV (Photo voltaic) energy is its simplicity and the opportunity to not only save our planet but also get free energy and/or earn money.

I would like to establish a small team of technically minded people from the village to produce a feasibility study of developing solar energy from two sites in the village.

Factors to be valued are:

- Cost to purchase equipment and labour
- Visual sacrifice
- Time to install
- Source of finance
- Distribution of ownership
- Amount free or low cost energy

I think we should at least investigate the feasibility of installing a solar solution . The follow on stage of the study would be to advise the real benefits together with losses for the village to approve.

This project will not happen overnight, it may upset some residents' view of the countryside and it will cost money.

We cannot ignore our situation for ever – action is required.

Brian Wilcockson

18 June 1931 – 6 December 2021

Brian was born in Barlow Derbyshire but moved to 'Tyrone' Bottrells Lane Chalfont St Giles in his youth with his parents Charles, Doris & older brother Peter. (The black & white photo below was taken in Brighton in 1950 and shows from left to right Peter, Brian, Doris & Charles, who have all now passed on).

During his National Service he joined the RAF Regiment and coming to the end of his service was asked to stay on which he politely turned down. He met his wife Janet on a coach tour to the south coast and they were married in March 1957. They had three children, Andrew, Tim & Heather.


Brian worked in the building trade for most of his life and was a carpenter when he worked on some of the houses built in Jordans. He bought a share in Jordans Village and many years later was offered the tenancy of Orchard Cottage.

Brian played cricket for both Chalfont St Giles & Jordans for a number of years, it was a game he loved. Brian in past years could be seen delivering his excess of runner beans & courgettes, the occasional marrow, during the summer months to villagers.

Brian died in December 2021 after a short illness at the age of 90. His ashes were scattered at the Meeting House.

Paws for Thought

Ooh Poo Pah Doo

On Saturday 26th of November (page 7) the Daily Telegraph published a short article by India McTaggart about the proposed Stop and Search policy by Hammersmith and Fulham Council. They are considering fining people £100 if they are found not to be carrying bags to pick up after their dogs when out walking.

They are also suggesting that the Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) limit the number of dogs that can be walked by one person to 4. It may also enforce the use of leads in public spaces such as cemeteries. In addition to this if a dog is seen to be acting in an aggressive manner its owner could be fined. London has apparently become overpopulated with dogs since the start of the pandemic and there has also been a noticeable increase in dog ownership throughout the country.

So how does one get the message across to dog walkers that they must do the responsible thing and pick up? Firstly, walkers must be vigilant, always keeping an eye on one's dog as it's easy to miss the event! Carrying enough bags is also essential, doubling up on the number of dogs you're walking, ie: 2 dogs 4 bags. Here in Jordans we are lucky enough to have two council bins for dog waste. Therefore, one would hope that both residents and visitors to Jordans, who walk their dogs in our woods and fields are acting responsibly and picking up after their dogs. However, this is evidently not the case as someone who walks dogs in our village most days, I have observed large and small deposits in Chalky Field, Crutches Wood, the village green and the verges. So let us as a community continue to pick up, and those that find the task too revolting for words, please get over your revulsion and pick up from now on out of respect for others and our environment.

I do hope I haven't put you off your mince pies! Have a dog safe Christmas and remember keep all chocolate, such as coins on a tree or boxes wrapped under a tree, mince pies, Christmas pudding and cake, stuffing mixes with onion, macadamia nuts and blue cheeses out of the reach of your dog!
