

Spindrift, Puers Lane, HP9 2TE

A exciting garden on different levels with a surprise round every corner! Fine hedges and trees, large collection of shrubs, herbaceous borders, a landscaped dell with pond, fruits, vegetables and greenhouses with vines.

Downfield, Jordans Lane, HP9 2SW

A garden of approximately one acre, on two levels. There is a formal front and back lawn on a shallow slope with a wild patch set above a landscape dell designed to resemble a dry river bed.

Comely Bank, Wilton Lane, HP9 2RG

This garden has been re-designed and landscaped over the last 7 years. Benefiting from established trees surrounding the grounds, it now enjoys woodland gardens, combined with informal cottage planting. Separately the garden has a pond area to attract natural wildlife. A springtime joy with great displays of daffodils and tulips, followed by bright summer colours throughout all the beds and borders complemented with majestic tree ferns.

Maxfield Cottage, Crutches Lane, HP9 2TG

Over a period of 30 years Jim and Denise have created, cared for and loved this garden. The garden wraps around the house creating different areas some broad and open, others more peaceful and intimate. Tucked behind a pergola they have created raised beds for growing vegetables, fruit and cut flowers. To the front of the house is a fairly large lawn with fruit trees at one end and surrounded by flower borders. To the side of the house there is a smaller lawn with a rockery and to the rear a further lawn with borders of flowers and shrubs.

Conifers, Crutches Lane, HP9 2TG

NEW THIS YEAR! A medium size garden containing a greenhouse, summer house, and pagoda. The garden consists of lawn, raised beds, small veg plot, flower beds and pond, there are several rhododendrons, hydrangeas perennials and spring flowers to be seen.

Upon arrival at Jordans Village, drive past the Jordans Village Estate Office on the Village Green, and turn right into Green West Rd.

Go past the Village Store and continue straight all the way to the end of the road where you will find Spindrift, tucked away on the left of the entrance to the Village School – please pay here before making your way to the remaining gardens.

Junior Jordans Sunday School



DfT News: Standard petrol is changing to E10





STANDARD PETROL IS CHANGING TO E10



When safe, check your vehicle at gov.uk/E10checker

Standard Petrol is changing to E10 - is your car compatible?

This summer the standard petrol grade in the UK will become E10. Currently, UK petrol is E5, meaning it contains up to 5% bioethanol. E10 petrol will see the amount of bioethanol increase to 10%.

Petrol cars manufactured after 2011 and most modern motorcycles are E10 compatible. However, around 5% of petrol vehicles made before 2011 will need to continue to use E5 petrol which will remain available as the super grade petrol option at the pumps.

Using E10 fuel in an incompatible petrol vehicle will not cause immediate harm but continued use could damage your engine's parts. If in doubt about the compatibility of your vehicle, you can use the online E10 vehicle checker or seek further advice from the vehicle manufacturer or garage.

Paws for Thought

Grass Seeds

This month due to the long grasses that are currently present in Chalky Field and other locations, I am submitting an adaptation of an article I posted in 2020 explaining how grass seeds can cause problems for dogs.

According to practising veterinary surgeon and animal welfare campaigner, Marc Abraham, it can be a painful and expensive business. Abraham explained in an article posted on The Kennel Club website, that the problem occurs because grass seeds have sharp pointy ends like arrows. Breeds with longer coats and floppy ears like Springer and Cocker Spaniels, and Cockapoos are most at risk, especially if walked in meadows or woodlands. As with most seeds, once attached to the fur of a dog they are unable to fall off, becoming trapped in its coat. The seed will eventually burrow down into the skin of the victim's body. The paws and ears are the most common site. The signs to look out for are paw licking, especially after a walk, lameness, and head shaking. If your dog is pawing at its head and ear, it could have a grass seed lodged in its ear canal. The dog may also tilt its head to one side in an attempt to shake the seed out. Seeds can also get stuck in a dog's nose, producing a bloody nasal discharge. Continuous sneezing, rubbing of the nose, and difficulty breathing can also be a sign. Seeds can also get trapped under the eyelid, and can be seen by pulling the lid up or down. In the worst case scenario an imbedded seed can cause internal damage that can be lethal. Once a grass seed is embedded it can travel to any part of the body such as the lungs, spinal cord, brain and abdominal organs. The seeds may also carry bacteria that could cause an infection.

If you think your dog may have a grass seed lodged somewhere it is advisable to get your dog seen by a vet as soon as possible. This will increase the chances of avoiding any complications. It is difficult to find an imbedded grass seed due to the fact that they are made of vegetable matter, this making them invisible on an X-ray. If the seed is visible the vet will try removing it with some specially designed tweezers known as 'crocodile forceps'. If a seed has become lodged in the ear the vet may use an otoscope to look down the ear canal. Sedation may be necessary prior to these procedures. Antibiotics will be prescribed if an infection has set in. On Petplan's, 'Vet's Corner', they advise taking

preventive action by keeping the fur around the dog's paws and ears short during the summer months. Checking for seeds on a regular basis after walking is also a worthwhile measure. If you are in tune with your dog you will help avoid problems such as these occurring. Abraham has a free iPhone App called 'MARC THE VET', which contains tips on how to keep your dog healthy. Images of what an infected paw and the different varieties of grass seeds might look like can be found online.

On a more cheerful note this month I'm including another poem by the Totnes based poet and lyricist Matt Harvey titled 'IN TUNE', about a Dalmadoodle, which is a Dalmatian and Poodle cross.


IN TUNE
