



Chalky Field Planting Update

The Society of Friends Yearly Meeting, which owns Chalky Field and Wall Field below it, has updated us on the woodland planting in Chalky Field and Wall Field just across the road from the Meeting House. An updated diagram is shown above. The types of tree they have planted are as follows:

Major Broadleaf Trees:

Pendunculate Oak, Wild Cherry, Small-leaved Lime, Hornbeam, Sycamore

Conifers:

Douglas, Fir, Corsican Pine

The Managing Agent has also explained:

"This is not a commercial project and if it was, these trees would take at least 25 years to be in a position to be felled, which is a considerable amount of time. The new woodland is extending ancient woodland and therefore this would not even be a possibility.

"The woodland is for the community to enjoy and is registered with the woodland carbon code as a carbon offset for the Religious Society of Friends.

"The Religious Society of Friends are looking at this work at a considerable cost for the benefit of the community and that planting and managing woodland is a costly process."

The Local Quaker Meeting has asked them if they would consider installing a new pedestrian gate on Jordans Lane opposite the Westminster gate into the burial ground, and another gate in the southwestern corner of Wall Field. A quote has been obtained and is currently under consideration by the Yearly Meeting before a decision is taken. They will inform us of the outcome in due course.




Planning Policy Consultation


Greenhouse

Junior Jordans (Sunday School)



Arthur Lewis Shepherd, 'The Quaker MP'

Shepherd's Cottage (formerly Arnlea) is named after Arthur Lewis Shepherd, MP. Arthur is one of two residents of Jordans who became MPs (Chris Grayling being the other). This article is in two parts: Arthur Shepherd's profile in James Johnston's book *A Hundred Commoners* where he is described as 'The Quaker MP'; and then an account of Arthur's life as an MP based on the memories of four of his six grandchildren: Sue Hayman, Joanna Herman, Chris Davies and John Davies.

Memories of Arthur Shepherd

Arthur Shepherd was born in Kings Norton, Birmingham on 7th February 1884 and was a youth worker and a teacher by profession. During WWI he was an ambulance driver in the Royal Army Medical Corps and served in the Dardanelles and at Gallipoli. Johnston's profile describes Arthur as 'The Quaker MP'; however, according to John Davies, his grandfather did not belong to the Jordans meeting. Nevertheless John thinks Arthur's link with Quakers and Jordans may well have been forged by his teaching experience in Reeth, Swaledale, North Yorkshire an area with Quaker history and also through sharing his WWI experience with Friends Ambulance colleagues.

As Labour candidate Arthur won the Darlington by-election in 1926. Needing a base near to Westminster he moved to Arnlea with his wife Wenna and their three daughters Eryl (11), Lorna(10) and Mary(4). He commuted to London in his Jowett Seven, which was partly funded by his Darlington constituents. Arthur was re-elected in the 1929 General Election which led to the first Labour government under Ramsay MacDonald.

John Davies says that Arthur's maiden speech in the Commons broke the "don't mention religion" tradition, referencing the Sermon on the Mount and *The Times* reported his even more radical act by not wearing a hat when he entered Parliament. Arthur featured again on the front page of *The Times* when he recounted his experiences disguised as a tramp in the workhouses of the day in order to reveal the awful conditions but where somehow humanity survived. He hit the headlines again when he cut a newly installed fence and encouraged trespass in Little Hampden near Chequers/Wendover around what had previously been known as common land. This was in July 1927 nearly five years before the celebrated mass trespass at Kinder Scout.

Arthur and Wenna and their three girls left Arnlea in 1930 and returned to London and lived in Clapham Common. He lost his seat in 1931 when the landslide victory by the Conservatives resulted in the Labour Party only winning 52 seats; Arthur returned to teaching in Manor Park in East Ham. The family eventually moved to Theydon Bois.

Arthur Shepherd only lived in Jordans for four years; However, two of his daughters, Eryl Hicks and Lorna Davies, returned to Jordans to live with their families in Puers for a total of seventy-nine

years. (Mary Bearblock, the third daughter, did not return to Jordans and lived with her husband Peter and their two girls, Sally and Jean, in Stoke Mandeville.)

Lorna attended Jordans Meeting for many years and became a member before she died on 22 September 2017; she is buried in Jordans Meeting House burial ground. Sue Hayman still lives in Puers Field and Chris Davies lives in Swarthmore, returning to Jordans as often as she can.



An Interesting Recipe!

An Introduction to the delights, absurdities, and horrors of a 19th century kitchen by Hattie Pegram

The noted author Alexander Dumas [The Three Musketeers, Monte Cristo] and gourmand wrote what was considered his masterpiece, Le Grand Dictionnaire de Cuisine published in 1873. Most of his recipes date from fifty to a hundred years before the date of writing in 1869.

His kitchen was huge and easily accommodated all his apparatus, appliances and gadgets needed for cooking. Among his equipment was an intricate mortar and pestle mechanism A stationary machine with the pestle handle running through fixed rings was operated by pulleys from the ceiling. Declining the use of a gas stove commonly in use at that time, the rest of his equipment was comprised of a fireplace, a grill, a baking oven, an oven and stove top – all fuelled with wood, charcoal and coal, a bain-marie and a Dutch oven. In front of the fireplace was a spit with notches set at appropriate distances from the fire. Elaborate machinery enabled the spit to be turned by hand

His recipes frequently called for cooking to be done with "fire under and over". This refers to a method in which the braising pot was set in coals or hot ashes. Over it was a special lid with raised edges and a long handle set vertically into the centre, to lift it for basting. Hot coals were piled within the rim..

Many of the recipes are illuminated with comments, history, anecdotes and caustic opinions, (a tradition continued by modern writers such as Elizabeth David and Jane Grigson) and are rather less about teaching novices and housewives how to cook and more a good read. Never- the -less the book was the bible of cookery books and no decent household would be without it..

Below is an example, not one I imagine which will get your gastronomic juices going or get you running to the kitchen to try it. However, if you are bent on becoming a famous/notorious hostess then this could be for you and it would make a great party dish.

The Bear Steak.

Written in his first book, Travel Impressions, Alexander Dumas, produced a sensation by claiming that there are places in civilised Europe where bear meat is eaten. Apparently a butcher in Paris could provide, if asked, a leg of bear from Canada or from Transylvania. Dumas was furious when an innkeeper wrote to the press denying that he, as Dumas had inferred, had ever served bear to travellers. This was his reply:

"If the idiot had thought of answering yes, and then served donkey meat, horse meat, mule meat, anything at all as bear, he could have made a fortune." Enough said.

Bear meat was eaten all over Europe, the front paws being regarded as a delicacy, especially by the Chinese and, believe it or not, the Germans.. I will gladly give you the recipe if you would like to try it but a word of warning, it takes hours and hours to cook. The availability of bear meat may be a problem but you could always take the advice of Dumas to the innkeeper without losing face.

Another recipe, this time from the celebrated and illustrious gastronome Brillat-Savarin which he concocted for a very sick friend. Should you want to try it and you are in need of a pick me up I am assured that it is most efficacious and your survival is guaranteed. What follows is the recipe for the

Elizir for Life

Most of the ingredients for this are quite easy to procure and you should have no trouble making it. You may find it time consuming but, upon reflection, think the end justifies the means. Take 6 large onions, 3 carrots, a handful of parsley. Chop fine and brown in butter. Add 2 ounces

of sugar candy, $1/3^{rd}$ ounce of crushed ambergris, a piece of toast and 3 quarts of water. Boil for 45 minutes adding more water to maintain 3 quarts. Meanwhile kill, pluck and clean an old rooster and pound the flesh and bones in a mortar and pestle. You should have no trouble doing this all you need is a strong arm and patience,

Chop up 2 pounds of prime beef and mix both meats well. Season with salt and pepper. Brown in butter. Stir in the bouillon and boil briskly for 45 minutes. And that's all there is to it.

The addition of a piece of toast is a bit mysterious but no doubt essential so don't leave it out.

Taken over a period of 4 days the patient made a full recovery. The good news is that if you are unable to find sugar candy and ambergris or a substitute they can be omitted leaving a fine soup worthy of a connoisseur. Presumably, the elizir will still retain its potency.

If you should find this too arduous and time consuming Brillat-Savarin has another suggestion. To my mind this simplified version is more suitable to our modern ways in this gloomy and disturbing time when a fast pick me up is even more desirable. It has the same effect of making life easier, thought processes clearer, insomnia banished and that feel good factor restored. Take a small piece of ambergris, crush it with sugar and add it to a big cup of hot chocolate. Or you could just stick with the chocolate.

NB Ambergris is sperm whale excrement. It is used in making expensive perfume. Described as Floating Gold because it floats in the sea before washing up on a beach its rarity makes it more expensive than gold or truffles. In the 19th century .it was widely used as an aphrodisiac. In some countries it is illegal to use it for commercial profit. I have read it is available on ebay.
