

The quality of our fruit and veg is second to none and the convenience of picking them up in the village first thing in the morning along with bread, milk and newspapers has got to be a major plus.

Natalie, for the foreseeable future, hasn't the manpower to deliver so I am making a rota of those of you who are up for collecting the boxes. It is the simplest job - just arrive outside Blackwell at 8:15 am - no problem parking - and the box will be ready for you. On return to Jordans leave it outside the front of the shop.

About the Village Store

Jordans Village Community Store, founded in 1922, is an independent community store, owned, operated and controlled by the Village. It is run by a combination of part-time staff and volunteers from the local community.

It started in a very small way in the front room of one of the early workers' cottages by the Village Green. In 1921, the brick building, now used as the Estate Office, was erected and a proper store opened.

The store is now a general grocers, with green groceries, an off-licence, a sub post office and café. It caters for online orders, and home delivery. We care about where our food comes from and how it is packaged, for example bread is baked for us at local bakeries in Chalfont St Giles and Little Chalfont; our milk is directly from a from a herd in Staffordshire; vegetables are via Blackwells - who pride themselves on locating the freshest fruit and vegetables and not covering them in plastic!

The Store also serves as a natural meeting place for many of those living around the village, so why not come in and receive a warm welcome from our friendly staff and team of volunteers who are all eager to help you. www.jordansvillagestore.co.uk/



Thoughts from the Chair, Nicki Gilham

Once again, the Green Belt campaign continued apace in Jordans in September, with residents' responses regarding the Local Plan now submitted via the District Council to the Planning Inspectorate. As you walk about our village, taking in the natural beauty of the Village Green, Crutches Wood and everything in between – appreciating the openness and greenness of our village, every bit is worth protecting. Indeed, I believe this should be our legacy to future generations.

I have had reason to learn, recently, about a lady — Octavia Hill (1838 -1912) who was a true campaigner in her time - she is renowned as a an innovator in public housing, was involved in the establishment of the National Trust and was a thought leader regarding playgrounds and public space. Her views were that we need four key aspects close to our homes - 'Places to sit in, places to play in, places to stroll in, and places to spend a day in' and to my mind Jordans, and of course the many neighbouring villages in the Chilterns give us just that, right on our doorstep.

I'm sure the campaigning to save our Green Belt is not yet over — and I do feel it is worth trying to ensure our views continue to be heard by the powers that be — the councillors, MP's, planning commissioners and more. Our green space is unique and should be preserved — I do think the words of Octavia Hill, back in 1875 are as relevant today as they were then — 'they (the fields) will be more and more valuable every year—valuable in the deepest sense of the word; health-giving, joy-inspiring, peace-bringing.'

JORDANS PICTURE HOUSE WINS AWARD FOR BEST SINGLE EVENT FOR ARMISTICE WEEKEND SCREENING

At the 50th "Cinema for All" Film Society of the Year Awards held in Sheffield for 2019 on Saturday September 21st, Jordans Picture House came first in the Best Single Event category for our Armistice Weekend events in November last year.


Our event included screenings of the films "Journey's End" and "War Horse," Sarah Lones's rendition of the popular song of that time "Roses of Picardy", displays of memorabilia, the Lest We Forget poppies slideshow, and the greeting of the audience by John, Georgina Wright's Welsh cob, a breed of horse frequently used on the Western Front, plus the readings of "A Letter from the Front" and the poem "Everyone Sang".





Paws for Thought

Man's Best Friend - Choosing a Puppy

This month I have met two new puppies here in Jordans; Nina, a black and white Cocker Spaniel, and Monty, a smooth haired Dachshund. So this has prompted me to write on the subject of how to go about choosing a puppy and what to look out for.

Many prospective dog owners choose their dog based on its looks not its personality. However, people quite often end up giving up their dog because it didn't behave in the way they had expected it to. Knowing what a breed was developed to do, and its behavioural traits, will increase the chance of making the right choice. By selecting a breed that will suit your lifestyle you are less likely to encounter problems. Good advice can be found on the Kennel Club and Blue Cross websites. It is also advisable to take one's time and be prepared to wait to get the dog you really want.

Consideration must be given to the breed's energy levels, future exercise requirements, affection levels and playfulness. When looking for a breeder it doesn't have to be a top one if you are not going to show the dog yourself. Top breeders will expect a premium price for their puppies, but unfortunately there are lots of people making large profits by selling puppies that have been poorly bred, some in terrible conditions. Many dogs are still sold through the so called 'puppy farms'. Young dogs should not be treated as a commodity to be traded at the convenience of their breeders, and serious health problems regularly arise from this type of mistreatment. When visiting a kennel or breeder one can make up one's own mind about the conditions in which the puppies have been reared. It is advisable to see the dam (mother) with the puppies in the litter and also the sire, since they both contribute to the puppies' DNA.

Puppies should be weaned by two months old and therefore able to be taken home, any later could cause socialisation problems in the future. When you find the puppy you want to take home, or as is often the case the puppy that selects you as its future owner, you should look for the following;

- Check the dog has sturdy strong limbs as these are a must for any breed with the exception of some (such as the Italian Greyhound).
- A puppy must be alert and have bright clean eyes with no discharge. Soreness or inflammation of the rims of the eyes, or eyes that are not completely clear may be a sign of present or potential disease.
- The membranes of the nose should be clear, free of discharge and not runny.
- The inside of its ears should be pink and shiny and clear of dark wax and inflammation.
- Its coat should be clean and pleasant to smell and handle. Look out for signs of sores or grittiness. Black 'goal dust' in the form of little black specs is a sign of fleas.
- Inspect the puppy's rear end for signs of diarrhoea.

The puppy should have been wormed, vaccinated, microchipped and have its relevant health certificates. It is good practice to go straight to your vet on your way home so your puppy can be examined and given the all clear. Some sellers will provide pet insurance for the first few weeks to cover any unexpected illness.

Once your puppy is able to go out for walks you will begin to realise just how having a dog can improve your wellbeing, whilst increasing your social life at the same time!
